Celebrating the success of Waka Mere



Tuesday 5 November, Honiara – Representatives from the private sector and the business community were joined by Solomon Islands Prime Minister Manasseh Sogavare on Tuesday 5th November 2019 for a Business Breakfast at the Heritage Park Hotel to celebrate the achievements of the fifteen (15) participating companies to the Waka Mere Commitment to Action.

This activity is led by the International Finance Corporation (IFC), a member of the World Bank Group, and SICCI, with funding support from the Australian and New Zealand governments.

The Waka Mere Commitment to Action, launched in 2017 by IFC and SICCI, has been a two-year initiative to improve business outcomes in Solomon Islands through advancing workplace equality.

Fifteen (15) of the largest companies in the Solomon Islands signed up for up to three commitments to progress which included promoting women in leadership, building respectful and supportive workplaces and increasing opportunities for women in non-traditional jobs.

Participating companies undertook business case research and training, workshops, and peer learning opportunities through the two-year initiative.

According to a report assessing the Waka

Mere Commitment to Action, more than 6,500 employees working in the fifteen (15) participating companies are now benefiting from more equal, supportive and respectful workplaces in the wake of the two- year initiative on gender equality. SICCI Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Ms Atenasi Ata says that Waka Mere Commitment to Action has highlighted two important things.

"Firstly, it has successfully harnessed the power of the private sector to shift unhelpful gender norms that hurt women and men's well-being and reduce economic prosperity.

"And secondly, it has posed lessons for employers in Solomon Islands regarding how to support their workforce. Many of the tools and approaches developed

under this program are being utilized in projects throughout the region and beyond.

"Being able to do this in a country such as Solomon Islands, and with stakeholders and target beneficiaries at differing levels of engagement and resourcing capacity, is something that the Chamber together with IFC is proud of," she said.

Ms Ata said the Waka Mere initiative recognizes that Solomon Islands is a country where women are underrepresented in paid work and decision making. And that at least two-thirds of our women are affected by violence, at great cost to the country's human development and the economy.

Speaking during the occasion to celebrate the successful completion of the program, Australian High Commissioner to Solomon Islands, HE Roderick Brazier reiterated that Australia is extremely proud to have supported these efforts.

"The participating companies have invested in making their workplaces safer and more supportive of their employees. They have also invested in

building a pipeline of future leaders and in expanding jobs for women.

"We know from a growing body of evidence that workplace gender equality and gender diversity in leadership is good for business," he said.

"Having diverse leadership teams will assess risks and opportunities differently. Support for women and men facing family violence can help keep them employed. All of these things contribute to better business, which in turn contributes to growth and more job creation in Solomon Islands," HE Roderick Brazier, Australian High Commissioner to Solomon Islands, said.

CEO Ata also acknowledged the participating companies including: Bank South Pacific; Bulkshop; Guadalcanal

Plains Palm Oil Ltd, GPPOL; Hatanga Construction Ltd; Heritage Park Hotel; National Fisheries Development; Solomon Airlines; Solomon Brewery; Solomon Islands National Provident Fund; Solomon Islands Ports Authority; Solomon Islands Tobacco Company Ltd; Water; Solomon Power; and Soltuna Company.

"The progress of Waka Mere has created a momentum for companies in Solomon Islands to continue advancing gender equality in their own workplaces, while advocating for more gender equal workplaces through the market. We are finalising plans to ensure that refresher courses, peer learning opportunities, and leadership trainings remain available for interested companies including those from outside this original 15 companies."

Government can learn from Waka Mere model: PM

Sunday 10 November, Honiara – Prime Minister Hon Manasseh Sogavare believes the national Government can learn from the Waka Mere model in improving gender equality in leadership roles in the country's public service.

Hon Sogavare was guest speaker at a business breakfast event to celebrate the successful completion and launch of the Waka Mere Commitment to Action report which shows 6,585 employees from fifteen companies in the private sector are now benefiting from more equal, supportive and respectful workplaces.

"I am of the view that Government can also learn from Waka Mere companies.

"We (Government) are the single largest employer in Solomon Islands but we are still a long way from gender equity in many of our leadership positions. The Waka Mere model is something we will be looking to learn from the role model companies here today," the Prime Minister said.

Prime Minister Sogavare said it is also important to note that Waka Mere wasn't

just about giving new opportunities for women in the workplace.

"It was also about making those workplaces safer and more supportive.

"Solomon Islands has very high rates of domestic violence. We know that this affects the health and happiness of our citizens. It also stunts the economy," he said.

Waka Mere worked with the participating companies on developing a structured approach to helping employees, both men and women, affected by violence so they could get the help they needed and stay

employed.

"Waka Mere has planted a seed. The seed has sprouted. We are beginning to see the fruits. I call on other companies in Solomon Islands join the Waka Mere team of companies as I commit to also lead my Government to adopt the same principles, the Prime Minister said.

IFC modelled the Waka Mere program on its global initiative, She Works, which saw leading companies adopt measures proven to enhance women's employment opportunities.

Aust delegation encouraged to do business here

Thursday 7 November, Honiara – SICCI remains committed to realising interest for foreign direct investment and will work with potential investors who will genuinely contribute to the economic development of the country and create jobs for local Solomon Islanders.

This was reiterated at a Business Breakfast SICCI hosted on Thursday 7th November 2019 for a business delegation from Australia who are in the country looking at creating partnerships with local businesses.

The event featured presentations relating to doing business in the Solomon Islands.

The Australian delegation are companies who visted the country for briefings with Solomon Water regarding upcoming projects the State-Owned Enterprise (SOE) has in the pipeline.

SICCI Chairman, Jay Bartlett spoke briefly at the event to welcome the delegation before Chief Executive Officer (CEO), Atenasi Ata highlighted the work the Chamber does in representing the private sector and its advocacy efforts for a conducive business environment.

Former Australian High Commissioner to the Solomon Islands, HE Roderick Brazier also spoke at the event commending SICCI in engaging with the Australian delegation with opportunities to do business in Solomon Islands.

Andrew Schloeffel, Counsellor for Economics at the Australian High Commission, gave a presentation on Australia's substantial contribution to infrastructure development in the

Solomon Islands.

He also highlighted key infrastructure projects in planning and currently being finalised, that if implemented and completed will contribute to improving the environment for business in the country.

Lynette Tuhanuku, Acting Director of the Foreign Investment Division, Ministry of Commerce, Industry, Labour and Immigration (MCILI) also made a presentation informing the visiting delegation about the ministry's guiding legal framework, the procedures and permits potential investors would need to know about in order to do business in Solomon Islands.

"Job creation for Solomon Islands' increasing youth population is of

utmost importance when encouraging investment into the country," SICCI Chairman, Mr Bartlett, said.

"If you're thinking of investing in the Solomon Islands, it is important to be part of the business community, as such, you are welcomed to reach out to the local Chamber of Commerce as we are always willing to work with you," the SICCI Chair told the visiting delegation.

The attendees heard of the many SThe Australian delegation was also joined by business people from Fiji, and New Zealand as well as other local contractors.

There were a total of approximately 80 people who attended the breakfast event.

SICCI commends PHAMA support for Kava standards in SI

Friday 15 November, Honiara – SICCI remains committed to working together with Pacific Horticulture Agriculture Market Access (PHAMA Plus) recognizing that Kava is an emerging cash crop in Solomon Islands that requires responsive and sustained support by stakeholders.

SICCI through its Export Industry Development Department has been working closely with PHAMA Plus to enhance the development of Industry Working Groups (IWGs) into representative and sustainable industry bodies. These IWGs are instrumental to bring together the government and the private sector to further the interests of the industries.

Currently there are four (4) industry working groups; Cocoa, Coconut, Handicraft, and Solomon Islands Timber Processors and Exporters Association (SITPEA) supported by the Chamber through its Export Industry Development department, Mr Nelson Kere the Executive Officer for the Chamber explains.

"The Chamber has fostered a strong relationship with all partners through these IWGs. We have had a slight

pause in that facilitative support as the Chamber looks for a new Export Industry Development Officer to replace Mr John Paul Alasia the former FIDO"

"We hope to finalise recruitment and have orientation with the IWGs and partners by end of the year."

"In the meantime, it is encouraging to note that important Work continues to be carried out with PHAMA support in developing a National Kava Standard

which will enhance local growers' chances to tap into overseas markets," Mr Kere said.

Agriculture is an important sector for the Solomon Islands National Economy. It provides for and sustains 85 percent of the rural population with food crops, cash crops and livestock for their daily livelihoods, food and social security, according to the Solomon Islands Agriculture Policy (2015-2019).

As such, it is important for further development to take place and opportunities to be made use of.

The trip comes under the Cultural Exchange component in the Education Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed by the Governments of Solomon Islands and China last year 2019.

This was an opportunity for the

delegation of media professionals to learn about the real situation on the ground and better understand China, the country with the world's second largest economy.

With the Solomon Islands Government having made the decision regarding its Taiwan and China foreign relations, SICCI is embracing these opportunities to explore more what this new relationship will entail.

In China the delegation visited sites and had meetings in Beijing, Guangzhou,

Jiangmen, Sanya and Shanghai.

Some of the places consist of China's best historical sites, tourism destinations, media companies, traditional medical hospital, Government and agriculture.

This was the first official media delegation to China since the establishment relations between the two countries.

Tuesday 3 November, Honiara – Board Chairman Jay Bartlett says the next year and the coming years is shaping up to be critical years for Solomon Islands as a nation.

Mr Bartlett uttered this when delivering his official remarks at the Business Excellence Awards (BEA) on Saturday 30th November at the Coral Sea Resort and Casino.

"If we can push improvements in corporate and Institutional Governance, political and social stability, sound economic management we can achieve more in the next five years than we have in the last four decades," he said.

He said the delivery of essential services is set to broaden and improve with large infrastructure projects planned for our key State-Owned Enterprises (SOE).

"Solomon Water, Solomon Power and the Solomon Islands Ports Authority (SIPA) all with ambitious plans and capital infrastructure programs that will further develop and broaden accessibility, quality and affordability of services much needed in our economic and social development. Water, Electricity and Trade facilitation are some of the basics of any successful economy and society.

"We as a people are also embarking on the largest single infrastructure program our nation has undertaken and is only successful with a partnership with multilateral donors and resource owners and our Government. This is the Tina River Hydro Project," the SICCI Chair highlighted.

He also highlighted that Solomon

Islands is set to host the largest sporting event in the Pacific region with the construction of much needed sporting facilities that will leave a legacy that we all want to be proud of.

"Successful delivery of the Pacific Games will give our capital a face lift and provide sporting facilities that our young populace can enjoy," he said.

Connectivity with roads and infrastructure with the planned Airport Upgrade, East Honiara Road and other infrastructure developments will also improve Solomon Islands as a tourist and investment destination.

Bina Harbor Project will also ensure development progress.

Mr Bartlett said this all has to be

achieved in the next five years.

"And this will only be achievable with successful partnerships," Mr Bartlett said, re-emphasizing the theme for the BEA 2019 'Partnerships for a Shared Future'.

"41 years ago, on the 7th July 1978 we were bestowed the destiny of self-rule and self-Governance. We woke up on the 8th of July 1978, reborn as independent people. We woke up that morning with the greatest of responsibilities to build this great nation. Today, for me, the concept has not changed, that responsibility has not left us. We must act like every day is the 8th of July 1978 with this great task ahead of us. We took the difficult path many years ago to seek peace, progress and prosperity by looking within ourselves for nationhood building," he said.

He continued: "The general rhetoric




Ruth Maetala
